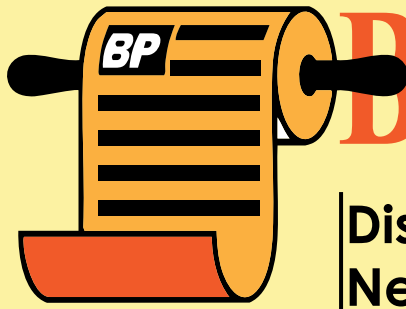

New Classrooms Give Flood-Affected Namilyango Primary School a Fresh Start

Hundreds of learners at Namilyango Primary School in Kiryandongo District are set to benefit from safer and more conducive learning conditions following the relocation of the flood-prone school to a new site in Rwempondo Village, Masindi Port Sub-county.

The district has commissioned new classroom blocks and sanitation facilities worth Shs398 million, marking a significant investment in climate-resilient education infrastructure. The project includes two classroom blocks with four classrooms and a 10-stance latrine, replacing facilities that had become unsafe due to recurring floods and unstable soils.

For years, seasonal flooding from the River Nile disrupted learning at the school's former site in Namilyango Village, damaging buildings, reducing enrolment, and exposing learners and teachers to unsafe conditions.

Kiryandongo District Education Officer Rev. Edward Kiirya said the relocation was necessary after repeated flooding caused classroom blocks to crack and gradually sink, posing a danger to occupants.

He noted that the district has already planned an additional two-classroom block in the 2026/2027 financial year to further expand learning space and meet growing enrolment.

The relocation also ends years of uncertainty for a school that had previously been forced to move after its original site, located on privately owned land, became unavailable.

Rwempondo Village LC I Chairperson Patrick Oberu welcomed the development, saying the safer location is expected to restore parents' confidence and increase enrolment. He observed that Namilyango Primary School serves children from both

Kiryandongo and neighbouring Apac District, making it a vital education facility for the surrounding communities.

Resident District Commissioner Dan Muganga urged parents and local leaders to ensure every school-age child is enrolled and appealed to the community to safeguard the new infrastructure for future generations.

District officials say the relocation reflects the growing need to invest in resilient public infrastructure as climate-related disasters increasingly threaten education facilities. By providing learners with a safer environment, the district hopes to improve attendance,

enhance learning outcomes, and secure uninterrupted education for communities vulnerable to flooding.

Electoral Commission Praised for Peaceful Conduct of 2026 General Elections

The Electoral Commission (EC) has been commended for the peaceful and professional conduct of the 2026 General Elections after a post-election survey found that the electoral process was largely well organised, secure and efficiently managed.

Presenting findings of an online survey during the Regional Post-Election Evaluation Workshop at Hoima Resort Hotel, Apollo Mugumya, a consultant with Adroit Consult International, said the assessment reflected strong performance by the Electoral Commission and its partners throughout the electoral process.

According to the survey, 76 per cent of polling stations opened on time, while

78 per cent received polling materials within the expected timeframe. It also found that 97 per cent of polling stations had adequate voting materials, contributing to a smooth voting process across the country.

The survey further showed that 88 per cent of respondents rated Electoral Commission officials as professional and impartial, while 87 per cent described the voting environment as peaceful and secure. Mugumya credited security agencies for maintaining law and order throughout the election period.

Efficiency at polling stations also emerged as a key strength, with 52 per cent of voters casting their ballots within 30 minutes. The report attributed this to effective queue management, efficient voter verification and improved polling procedures.

However, the assessment identified areas requiring improvement. About 30 per cent of voters spent between 30 and 60 minutes at polling stations, while 10 per cent waited for one to two hours. The delays were linked to biometric voter verification failures, late opening of some polling stations and congestion at busy polling centres.

To strengthen future elections, the survey recommended upgrading biometric voter verification equipment, ensuring timely delivery of polling materials, paying election officials promptly, expanding continuous voter education programmes and improving internet connectivity to support electoral operations.

The workshop brought together Resident District Commissioners, District Chairpersons, Chief Administrative Officers, security officials and representatives of Special Interest Groups from across the Albertine Region to review the electoral process and identify opportunities for improvement.

Closing the workshop, Electoral Commission Commissioner for the Albertine Region Carolyn Bainemaryo thanked stakeholders for their constructive feedback, saying the recommendations would help strengthen future elections. She said the Commission would prioritise continuous civic and voter education to improve public understanding of electoral processes and encourage greater participation.

BULIISA: Ministry of Health Pushes Full Adoption of Electronic Medical Records

The Ministry of Health has called for the full integration of the Electronic Medical Records (eAFYA) system at Buliisa General Hospital, describing digital health records as critical to improving patient care, medicine

accountability and the efficiency of healthcare services.

The call was made during a health monitoring visit to Buliisa District by a high-level Ministry of Health delegation

led by Dr Henry G. Mwebesa, Chairperson of the Health Service Commission. The team assessed service delivery across the Bunyoro sub-region and inspected key departments at Buliisa General Hospital.

The delegation commended the hospital for rolling out the eAFYA system, which captures patient information in a central database to improve record management, strengthen clinical decision-making and enhance accountability in the use of medicines and medical supplies.

The system also supports monitoring of health workers' performance by documenting patient management and treatment processes, helping to improve transparency and service delivery.

During the inspection, the team assessed maternal and child health services, the maternity and neonatal units, the operating theatre, outpatient and inpatient departments, laboratory services and the blood bank. While acknowledging progress, the team observed that the electronic medical records system had not yet been fully integrated across all hospital

departments and urged management to accelerate its implementation.

Medical Superintendent Dr Kisombo Dean highlighted several operational challenges affecting the hospital, including a digital X-ray machine that has remained non-functional for more than four years despite being installed by the Ministry of Health. He also reported that the hospital's incinerator plant has never become fully operational.

The hospital further appealed for capital development funding to expand the overcrowded maternity unit and construct additional wards and staff houses to meet the growing demand for healthcare services.

In response, Dr Mwebesa assured hospital management that the monitoring team's findings would be submitted to the Ministry of Health's senior management for action.

Strengthening digital health systems alongside investment in health infrastructure is expected to improve service delivery, enhance accountability and ensure better healthcare outcomes for communities in Buliisa District.

BULIISA: Schools Integrate Gender Inclusion into Improvement Plans

Buliisa District's education sector has stepped up efforts to promote inclusive learning by integrating Gender Equality, Safeguarding and Inclusion (GESI) into School Improvement Plans, a move expected to improve learner retention and create safer school environments.

The initiative is being implemented in partnership with Link Community Development Uganda under a regional pilot programme involving Uganda, Malawi and Ethiopia. It seeks to ensure that schools embed gender-responsive approaches into planning and day-to-day management.

The commitment was reaffirmed during a one-day Institutionalisation

Tracker stakeholder engagement in Hoima City, jointly organised by Link Community Development Uganda and the Ministry of Education and Sports. The meeting brought together education stakeholders to review progress in mainstreaming gender inclusion in schools.

Presenting findings from a two-year regional research programme, representatives from the Malawi Centre for Educational Research and Training (CERT) and the University of Glasgow reported a 30 per cent increase in girls' retention in schools that had integrated gender equality, safeguarding and inclusion initiatives into their programmes.

Link Community Development Uganda Country Director Denis Olak Ongaya said the project had also delivered encouraging results in Uganda. Research conducted in Buliisa, Hoima and Kikuube districts showed a 17 per cent increase in girls' retention over the past two years following the adoption of GESI interventions.

However, Buliisa District Inspector of Schools Godfrey Muhumuza urged education stakeholders to adopt a more balanced approach, noting that while significant progress has been made in empowering girls, many boys are increasingly dropping out of school

to engage in casual labour.

He called on Community Based Services departments and development partners to invest in programmes that also support boys, warning that neglecting one group could create future social challenges, including increased domestic violence.

Education leaders say integrating GESI into School Improvement Plans will help schools create safer, more inclusive learning environments, improve learner retention and ensure that both girls and boys have equal opportunities to complete their education.

KIKUUBE: New Sub County Leadership Begins Term with Focus on Service Delivery

Bugambe Sub County has ushered in a new political leadership following the swearing-in of 16 councillors, with leaders pledging to work together to improve service delivery, infrastructure and the welfare of residents.

The inauguration ceremony, held at the Bugambe Sub County headquarters, was presided over by Deputy Chief Administrative Officer Henry Kakande and the Sub County Chief, Mourine Kabagenyi, officially marking the start of the new council's five-year term.

Speaking after taking the oath of office, Sub County Chairperson Joseph Bikwatiramunda called on councillors to put aside political differences and unite in advancing the area's development

agenda.

"We must work together for the good of Bugambe. Our priority is to improve service delivery and the well-being of our people," he said.

The council immediately convened to elect its leadership, with Solomon Twinomujuni emerging as Speaker after defeating Nelson Atichi, while Margaret Akugizibwe was elected Deputy Speaker.

Chairperson Bikwatiramunda also named his executive committee, appointing Patrick Atuhurra as Vice Chairperson, Anita Nakayiza as Secretary for Production, Melan Ahimbisibwe as Secretary for Works and Nelson Atiche as Secretary for Social Services.

District councillors representing

Bugambe congratulated the new leadership but expressed concern over the sub county's limited representation in the district executive, warning that the gap could affect the area's ability to influence development priorities.

The leaders highlighted key challenges facing Bugambe, including poor road infrastructure and the absence of a Health Centre IV, and appealed for increased investment in essential public services.

District Chairperson Paddy Kisembo assured residents that addressing these challenges would remain a priority. He pledged to work closely with the new leadership to improve infrastructure,

education and living standards across the sub county.

Kisembo cited Kitondora Primary School as one of the institutions requiring urgent intervention, noting that although enrolment is high, pupil completion rates remain low. He urged leaders to work collectively to improve education outcomes and accelerate local development.

Residents expressed optimism that the new leadership would translate its commitments into tangible improvements in public services, infrastructure and socio-economic development over the next five years.

KIRYANDONGO: Communities Donate Land For Agro-Processing Hubs to Boost Farmers' Incomes

Communities in Nyinga II and Lavorongur A villages in Kiryandongo District have donated four acres of land for the establishment of agro-produce dehydration hubs, paving the way for increased value addition, reduced post-harvest losses, and improved incomes for local farmers.

The land was officially handed over on July 10 through a Memorandum of Understanding signed by the landowners, Excel Hort Consult Agribusiness Incubator (EHCAI), and Kiryandongo District Local Government.

The hubs will be established by EHCAI with funding from the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) under the Dehydrated Value Chains (DVC) Project. The initiative seeks to strengthen

agricultural value chains by enabling farmers to process, preserve, and market produce more competitively.

Under the agreement, EHCAI will operate the facilities while training local farmer groups to eventually manage them as sustainable community enterprises.

Dr. Charles Malingu of EHCAI said the dehydration hubs will encourage farmers to increase production, organise for collective bulking, and access better-paying markets through value addition.

He noted that modern dehydration technology will extend the shelf life of perishable produce, improve product quality, and open opportunities in both domestic and export markets. The project is also expected to create jobs

for youth and women in processing, packaging, transportation, and marketing.

Nyinga II Local Council I Chairperson James Ojansuk described the project as a major milestone for the community and urged residents to safeguard the facilities once established.

One of the land donors, John Tindyebwa, who voluntarily contributed two acres, said supporting the project was an investment in the future of the community.

Kiryandongo District Commercial Officer Sam Kakumba said the planned

solar-powered dehydration facility will help farmers minimise post-harvest losses while improving the quality and marketability of agricultural produce.

He encouraged farmers to embrace commercial production and take ownership of the project to ensure the facilities operate at full capacity.

The dehydration hubs are expected to accelerate agricultural commercialisation in Kiryandongo by linking farmers to value addition and reliable markets, strengthening household incomes and contributing to sustainable rural economic growth.

Kiryandongo Receives Vehicle to Strengthen Climate-Smart Agriculture

Kiryandongo District Local Government has received a new Toyota Hilux Double Cabin pickup under the Uganda Climate Smart Agriculture Transformation Project (UCSATP), boosting the district's capacity to deliver agricultural extension services and promote climate-smart farming.

The vehicle, provided through the World Bank-funded project implemented by the Ministry of Agriculture, Animal Industry and Fisheries (MAAIF), is expected to improve field supervision, farmer outreach, and implementation of government agricultural programmes across the district.

District Production and Marketing Officer Byenkya Issa Hassan said the vehicle will enable extension workers to reach more farmers promptly with technical guidance on climate-smart agriculture, helping improve productivity and resilience to climate change.

"This vehicle will facilitate timely field operations and enhance service delivery, ensuring the successful implementation of the Uganda Climate Smart Agriculture Transformation Project," he said.

CAO Anselm Kyaligonza welcomed the

support, describing it as a significant boost to the district's agricultural transformation agenda. He urged the Production Department to use the vehicle strictly in accordance with the project's Memorandum of Understanding to maximise its impact.

Kyaligonza noted that improved mobility for extension staff would enable more farmers to access advisory services, adopt climate-smart farming practices, and strengthen market linkages for agricultural produce.

RDC Dan Muganga called for proper management and routine maintenance of the vehicle to ensure it serves the district effectively throughout the project's lifespan. He also encouraged extension officers to use the resource to provide timely support that helps farmers increase production and adapt to the effects of climate change.

District leaders believe the additional transport will strengthen monitoring of project activities and improve the delivery of extension services, contributing to higher agricultural productivity and more resilient farming systems in Kiryandongo District.

MASINDI: District Welcomes Monthly National Cleaning Campaign

Masindi District has officially launched the National Cleaning Day campaign, committing to monthly community clean-up exercises aimed at improving sanitation, protecting public health and promoting environmental conservation.

The initiative follows a directive from the Office of the Prime Minister and was inaugurated with a district-wide clean-up exercise led by Chief Administrative Officer Samuel Ruhweza Kaija. District leaders, government officials and residents joined efforts to clean the surroundings of Masindi General Hospital, one of the district's busiest public health facilities.

The campaign is being implemented

under the national theme, "A Clean Uganda is Everybody's Responsibility," which encourages citizens to take an active role in maintaining clean and healthy communities.

Within Masindi Municipality, the exercise focused on Kijura Cell, particularly the market area, where participants cleared accumulated waste and restored proper sanitation to improve the trading environment and reduce public health risks.

Speaking after the exercise, Masindi District Vice Chairperson Bright Mugume, who represented the District Chairperson, applauded residents, local leaders and development partners for supporting the campaign. He

announced that the clean-up exercise will be held on the last Saturday of every month in line with the national directive.

Mugume said Masindi General Hospital would remain one of the priority areas for the monthly exercises to ensure the facility maintains high sanitation standards for patients, health workers and visitors.

Chief Administrative Officer Samuel Ruhweza Kaija thanked stakeholders for responding promptly despite the short notice under which the directive was

issued. He added that future clean-up activities would rotate across different parts of the district to ensure every community benefits from the initiative.

District leaders believe the campaign will strengthen community participation in sanitation, improve environmental cleanliness and contribute to the prevention of disease outbreaks. By institutionalising monthly clean-up exercises, Masindi aims to foster a culture of shared responsibility for a cleaner, healthier and more sustainable environment.

MASINDI: New District Service Commission Chairperson Pledges Merit-Based Recruitment

The newly appointed Chairperson of the Masindi District Service Commission, Adolf Kato, has pledged to uphold transparency, integrity and merit-based recruitment after being sworn into office alongside Kaahwa Sharif Juma, the commission's new representative for Urban Authorities.

The two officials took the oath before Masindi Chief Magistrate, His Worship Justine Gumtwero Olal, during a ceremony held at the district

headquarters.

While administering the oath, Chief Magistrate Olal urged the commissioners to discharge their duties with professionalism, independence and integrity. He advised them to remain guided by the law and consult the Public Service Commission, the district's political leadership and the technical team whenever they encounter challenges in executing their mandate.

Speaking after taking the oath, Kato thanked the district leadership for the confidence placed in him and committed to leading an independent,

transparent and corruption-free District Service Commission.

He said appointments and promotions under his leadership would be based

strictly on merit, competence and fairness, stressing that personal connections, favouritism and other forms of bias would have no place in the commission's work.

Kato, a retired educationist with extensive experience in public service, succeeds Benjamin Byarugaba, whose term expired. Kaahwa Sharif Juma replaces Swaib Kyamanywa as the representative of Urban Authorities on the commission.

Masindi District Chairperson Patrick Wobusobozi challenged the new commissioners to execute their mandate impartially and resist practices such as nepotism, favouritism and personal vendettas that undermine public confidence in government institutions.

He urged the commission to work closely with the District Executive, the Chief Administrative Officer and the Human Resource Department to ensure recruitment and promotion processes

strengthen the district's capacity to deliver quality public services.

Wobusobozi expressed confidence that a professional and independent District Service Commission would help build an efficient, accountable public service capable of supporting effective governance and improving service delivery for the people of Masindi.

MASINDI: Newly Elected Leaders Trained to Improve Governance and Service Delivery

Newly elected leaders in Masindi District have completed a two-day induction programme designed to strengthen their understanding of local government systems, improve accountability and enhance service delivery.

Held at the Masindi District headquarters, the training brought together district councillors, security officials and

technical staff to build their capacity to effectively execute their responsibilities under Uganda's decentralisation policy.

Facilitating the induction, Walter Akena, a Research Officer at the Advocates Coalition for Development and Environment (ACODE), said strengthening the capacity of local governments is essential for delivering quality public services and promoting

sustainable local development.

He said the programme introduced participants to the background and objectives of decentralisation, the roles and responsibilities of elected leaders, and the importance of local governments in driving socio-economic development.

According to Akena, well-informed leaders are better positioned to make sound policy decisions, provide effective

oversight and respond to the priorities of the communities they serve.

Representing the Chief Administrative Officer, the Deputy Chief Administrative Officer, Jane Akiror, described the induction as timely, noting that newly elected leaders require a clear understanding of their mandates to effectively perform their duties.

She urged councillors to apply the knowledge gained during the training by

exercising effective oversight, promoting transparency and accountability, and serving with integrity to advance the district's development agenda.

Akiror also called for close collaboration between political leaders, technical officers and security agencies, saying coordinated leadership is critical to improving service delivery and ensuring government programmes reach intended beneficiaries.

The induction is expected to strengthen governance structures within the district by enhancing cooperation among key stakeholders, improving decision-making and reinforcing accountability in the implementation of public programmes. Better-equipped leaders are also expected to provide more responsive leadership that addresses the needs and aspirations of the people of Masindi.

Religious Leaders Urged to Champion Ethical Values to Strengthen Communities

Religious leaders in Masindi District have been urged to take a leading role in promoting ethical values within families and communities as part of broader efforts to rebuild Uganda's moral fabric and support sustainable national development.

The appeal was made by Assistant Commissioner for Religious Affairs in the Office of the President, Justus Rubarema, during an engagement with Religious and Faith Organisations (RFOs) at the Masindi District headquarters.

Rubarema said faith institutions are uniquely positioned to influence attitudes and behaviours and should complement spiritual guidance with

practical efforts to nurture integrity, responsibility, and ethical conduct within society.

He explained that the National Ethical Values Policy seeks to build and sustain a morally upright society founded on integrity, accountability, and patriotism in line with Uganda's long-term development aspirations.

According to Rubarema, the policy promotes ethical leadership through stronger institutional systems, supportive legal and policy frameworks, human resource development, and enhanced accountability involving government, the media, civil society, and faith-based organisations.

He also highlighted key national values promoted under the policy, including respect for humanity and the environment, honesty, justice, hard work, integrity, innovation, social responsibility, national unity, and patriotism.

Masindi District Chief Administrative Officer Samuel Ruhweza Kaija challenged religious leaders to use their influence not only to foster spiritual growth but also to mobilise communities to embrace government wealth creation programmes such as the Parish Development Model (PDM), Emyooga, the Uganda Women Entrepreneurship Programme (UWEP),

and the Youth Livelihood Programme (YLP).

He noted that greater public awareness and participation in these initiatives would improve household incomes while reinforcing ethical and responsible citizenship.

District leaders said partnerships between government and faith-based organisations remain vital in promoting ethical leadership, strengthening families, and building resilient communities capable of driving inclusive socio-economic transformation.
